Gaudete, or the week in Advent in which we rejoice.

This week in Advent breaks the rules, because

Advent is a time to be told by John the Baptist that all of us are part of the brood of vipers that need to repent and turn back to the Messiah. Gaudete is Latin for Rejoice, and as the Church, we do rejoice, not only because the liturgy lightens up and focuses on joy, but also because the Messiah has come, and we are part of His family now.

Classes for the first Semester are done! My classes need to turn in grades by the end of the month, so I don't know for sure that I passed, but I am confident that I did. Looking back

on the Semester, my favorite class would have to be the Prophets. In it, we got to read



all twelve Minor Prophet books in English, and read a major section in Hebrew. It really strengthened my understanding of these books, how to find Jesus in the books without dismissing the immediate prophesy that the Prophets are also warning against, and it strengthened my Hebrew learning.

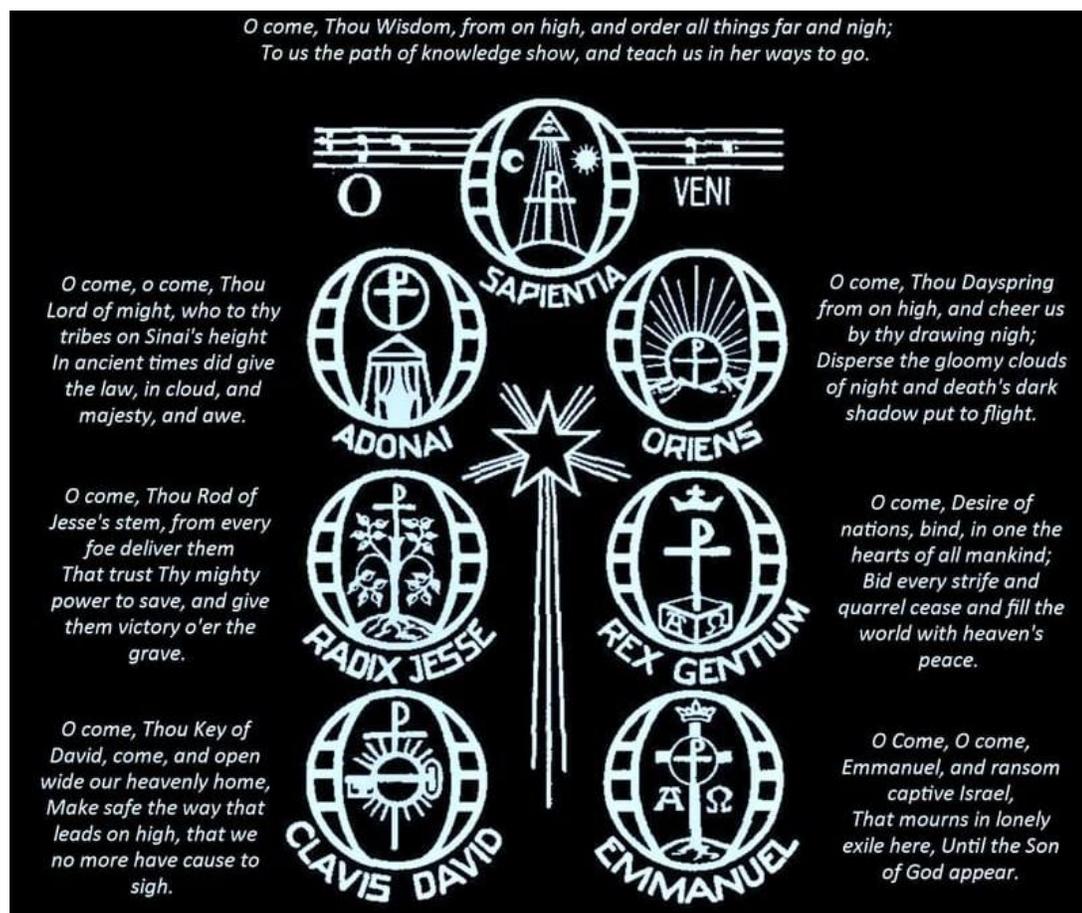
### Prayer List:

Advent is one of my favorite seasons of the Church Year, and not only because we prepare for Christmas. As I mentioned earlier, I love the penitential time of Advent with the surprise of joy in the middle of it with Gaudete Sunday. One additional reason that I love Advent is because of the Last week of Advent. Historically, the entire Church would do Evening Prayer together, and for the last week of Advent, the prayer of the day would speak about the coming Christ with different names used for each day. You have probably seen these prayers, because they are the O Antiphons, which is



the basis for our hymn, O Come, O Come Emmanuel. Each of the O Antiphons shows a different aspect of our Messiah, Christ, and King who has come, and yes, is coming again. John warns us to repent before Jesus comes, and we still do, by daily drowning our old Adam. Yet, with each of the O Antiphons, we see more clearly of who Jesus also is,

culminating with Emmanuel, God with US. God's richest blessings to all of you this month!†
